- i) What was the suggestion?

- Ans. The suggestion was to put Christy in an institution for special children.
- ii) What did the relatives think of the boy?
- Ans. The relatives thought that Christy was an idiot and beyond help.
- iii) Why was the mother against the idea?
- Ans. His mother was against the idea of sending her son to an institution because she firmly believed that Christy was not an imbecile. It was his body that was shattered, not his mind.
- b) "The tattered outlaw of the earth, Of ancient crooked will."
- i) Who is a 'tattered outlaw'?
- Ans. The donkey calls itself a 'tattered outlaw.'
- ii) Why does the speaker think so?
- Ans. The donkey says so because he belongs to the lowly class of animals that is made to do menial tasks and is treated as a beast of burden.
- iii) Why does the speaker call himself a product of 'ancient crooked will'?

- Ans. Sir Charles' heart was affected and the constant anxiety was taking a toll on his health. Hence, it was important for him to go to London.

- Ans. Mr. Stapleton, a mutual friend, was also very worried about Sir Charles' health.

- i) Who is referred to as 'him' in the above line?
- Ans. The person being referred to in the above line is Sir Henry Baskerville, the last remaining heir in the Baskerville family.
- ii) Why was Dr. Mortimer worried about this man?
- Ans. Dr. Mortimer was worried about Sir Henry's safety as every Baskerville member who lived at the estate met with an evil fate and died under mysterious circumstances.
- iii) What advice did Sherlock Holmes give Dr. Mortimer?
- Ans. Sherlock Holmes advised Dr. Mortimer to meet Sir Henry but not to tell him anything until he had made up his mind about the matter.
- h) "Finally, I examined the body which had not been touched."
- i) Why did Dr. Mortimer find it difficult to recognise the dead body of Sir Charles?
- Ans. Dr. Mortimer found it difficult to recognise the dead body of Sir Charles because his face was distorted with strong emotion.
- ii) What false statement had been given by Barrymore at the inquest?
- Ans. The false statement that Barrymore made at the inquest was that there were no marks on the ground around the body when actually there were.
- iii) What had Dr. Mortimer noticed that Barrymore hadn't?
- Ans. Dr. Mortimer noticed fresh and clear footprints which he believed belonged to a gigantic hound.
- i) "I myself wouldn't have noticed it if I had not known the legend."
- i) What would the speaker have not noticed?

Ans. Dr. Mortimer would not have noticed the marks around Sir Charles' body.

ii) Why had others not noticed it?

Ans. Others did not notice these marks as they were about 20 yards away from the body and no one gave them any importance.

iii) What 'legend' does the speaker refer to in the above line?

Ans. The 'legend' referred to in the above line is the legend of the hound of the Baskervilles that haunts the moor at night.

i) Whom does the speaker call 'fools' and why?

Ans. The donkey calls people 'fools ' because humans look down upon him and regard him as a stupid, insignificant animal.

ii) What is the 'hour' being spoken about here?

iii) What happened during this 'hour'?

Ans.
